

The 1 GOAL World Cup Assembly (Key Stage 3) – Send My Friend to School 2010

Part one - Quiz

The quizmaster enters the stage. Ask for six volunteers – three pupils and three teachers. Ask them to stand at the front facing each other and toss a coin to decide who holds the football first. “You will be asked a series of questions. You can only answer a question if you are holding the football. If you get the question right you throw the football to another person in your team. If you get it wrong, you throw it to the ‘opposing team’. One point per correct answer!”

The correct answers are highlighted for you in ‘bold’ below.

- What is happening today (June 11)? The Olympics; **The FIFA World Cup**; The World Tiddlywinks Championship)
- How many African footballers play for the English premier league? (**40**; 20; 30)
- In which African country is it happening? (Ghana; **South Africa**; Nigeria)
- How many African countries are playing in the World Cup? (4; 5; **6**)
- Who was the first democratically elected president of South Africa? (Desmond Tutu; Kofi Annan; **Nelson Mandela**)
- How many primary school children don't go to school in the world? (1 million; 14 million; **72 million**)
- How many of them live in Africa? (10%; 25%; over **50%**)
- There are more boys than girls who miss out on school. (True or **False**)
- What have world leaders promised to do by 2015? (Ban homework; Achieve world peace; **Give all children the chance to go to school**)
- What is the **1 GOAL campaign** about? (Making sure England score at least once; **Using the occasion of the world cup to show your support for global education**)
